The 2017-18 operating year came to an end June 30, and we reached another benchmark by making it possible for COK to deliver over 21,000 articles of school clothing to 3,900 kids in our area. Those deliveries are the highest in number attained in our history.

The past year turned out to be our best fundraising year. We reached this milestone because of the generosity of businesses and donors from all walks of life: corporations, foundations, Sussex County Council, churches, individual donors and, of course, our annual golf tournament.

We can't serve the needy children in our community alone. It takes a village and I want to say thank you to our donors, benefactors, and friends who made this year so great:

- Corporate donors \$13,905
- Foundation grants \$29,770
- Individual donors \$20,997
- Group donations \$23,394
- Sussex County Council grants \$4,775

How does COK use these contributions?

The answer is that during this past operating year, 90 percent of contributed dollars went directly to our mission which is to help clothe the underprivileged children of Sussex County. The remaining 10 percent went to fundraising and administrative costs. These are admirable percentages and they could not have been achieved without help from the community.
